EBBING INTEREST IN RENEWABLE ENERGY - Selectmen discussed wind turbines and solar panels as alternative energy sources for the town at their last meeting, but decided the concept was not feasible, Selectman Stephen Dungan said. Solar panels are expensive and require extensive space, and wind speeds in Stow are so low that wind turbines are not a viable option, he said. Selectmen also are involved in too many other activities right now to take on such a large project, he said. - Matt Gunderson

Gibbs is the owner of Highland-March Executive Suites in Westborough. Ashland

WATER EMERGENCY SUBSIDING - The significant amount of precipitation over the past several months has helped Ashland ease off its temporary reliance on water from Southborough, according to Assistant Town Manager Mark Purple. The emergency use was due to the severe drought conditions last summer and into the fall, which dropped the level of the town's drinking water source, the Hopkinton Reservoir, more than 7 feet below



capacity. "Despite the fact that we made adjustments to our pumping rates and times, the volume of water was not sufficient to meet demand," Purple said. The town started using water from Southborough in early December through a temporary hydrant connection on Thomas Road. While the agreement allows up to 750,000 gallons daily, Ashland was taking no more than 300,000 gallons per day, Purple said. Last week, the town cut back its consumption to about 150,000 gallons per day five days per week. "Hopefully by the end of the month or early February, we should be solely back on our own supply," Purple said. - Rachel Lebeaux
